PLEASANT VIEW.

Home of Mrs. Eddy to Be Sold for
 Taxes on May 23.

Pleasant View, the home of the late Rev. Mary Baker G. Eddy before the head of the Christian Science cult was spirited away to Massachusetts, together with the lot of land on Tuttle street owned by the estate, are advertised by Collector Ladd to be sold for unpaid taxes on May 23.

The total tax assessed against the properties is \$417, and the present condition arises through the refusal of Hon. Henry M. Baker, the executor of the estate, to pay on the ground that the assessment is unjust and extortionate.

EDDY HOME NOT TO BE SOLD.

Executor Pays Concord Tax Arrears
Under Protest—To Sue City.

CONCORD, N. H., May 15.—Pleasant View, the former home in this city of the late Mrs. Mary Baker G. Eddy, founder of the Christian Science Church, will not be sold for unpaid taxes.

Sometime ago, after the executor of the Eddy estate had declined to pay the taxes for the present year on the ground that they were excessive, the spacious house and grounds, where many times thousands of pilgrims had gathered to pay homage to the Christian Science leader, were advertised to be sold by the city. Counsel for the executor, Henry M. Baker of Bow, however, has paid the taxes under protest.

It is announced that the executor will appeal to the courts for an abatement of a portion of the taxes.

SCIENTISTS' HOME OPENED.

Mrs. Eddy's Followers Have New
Place to Enjoy Right

The First Christian Science Home of New York was opened formally last night at No. 140 West Ninety-fifth street. There was a musical programme and an address by the Rev. Silas M. Booth, of the First Church of Christ, Scientist. One hundred persons listened to the music and address and inspected the new quarters.

Officers of the home are Mrs. Lysbeth L. Campbell, president; Miss Anna Strudergard, vice president, and Emerson P. Jennings, secretary and treasurer. When Mrs. Campbell first broached the project leaders in the First Church opposed her idea, but she quoted a letter from Mrs. Eddy on which her project was based. Later when it was made evident that the place was not to be a sanitarium, but a retreat for those who sought to get in the right vibration, opposition dwindled and all was peace and harmony at the opening kath-
